
DEAR ALL:

We are pleased to share the annual activity report of the Center for Technology and Society Studies (CETyS, Centro de Estudios en Tecnología y Sociedad), a document that reflects our ongoing commitment to our mission of being a leading regional center for research, training, and outreach on digital policy and development in the public sphere. The year 2025 has been a period of consolidation and growth, marked by a dedication to academic training, research, and advocacy on critical issues on the Latin American digital agenda.

In terms of training, we continued to offer postgraduate programs and continuous education, an achievement that is largely due to the experience and knowledge of our international, expert, and multidisciplinary teaching team. In this regard, the Diploma in Internet Governance (DiGI) was, once again, a high-level forum for debate and exchange on digital governance, covering aspects such as infrastructure, cybersecurity, platforms, and the economic and political disruptions of Artificial Intelligence. The Digital Technologies Law Program (DTD), now in its 11th edition, reaffirmed its relevance through ongoing content updates, addressing the challenges of a constantly evolving field with profound impacts on the economy, the state, and social life. The 3rd edition of the International Diploma in Personal Data Protection (PDP) provided professionals with advanced knowledge of legal and public policy aspects related to data processing, with intensive training geared toward the role of Data Protection Officer (DPO).

In the area of research and projects, CETyS has made valuable contributions to the region, with two initiatives being particularly noteworthy. We have continued and deepened our work on the project "Latin America at the crossroads of generative AI and its responsible adoption in the judicial sphere", a seminal study addressing the challenge of integrating new AI tools within justice systems through an ethical and human rights-based framework. We have also strengthened our international partnerships by maintaining our active participation in "The HEMISPHERES Initiative", a key international consortium for networking and collaboration on digital policies at a global level.

We invite you to explore the following pages to learn more about the activities and achievements that defined our 2025. We extend our deepest gratitude to our community, our strategic partners, and all those who trust in the work of CETyS. Looking ahead to a future of constant digital transformation, we renew our commitment to remaining a space for research, training, and impact in 2026.

DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES LAW (DTD)



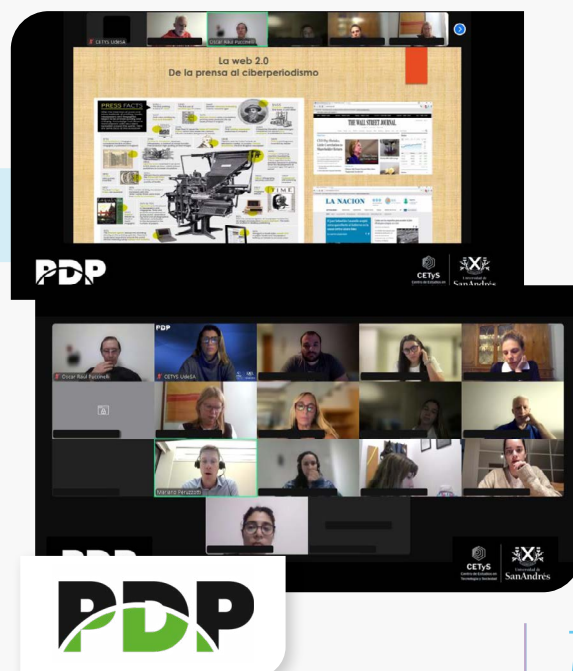

The [Digital Technologies Law](#) program aims to train professionals from different disciplines in the most relevant and current legal and public policy aspects for companies, organizations and consultants working in the Internet, digital technology and telecommunications industry. This year a new edition was held, which included, as every year, updates of its contents to meet the challenges of an ever-changing subject matter and with increasingly profound impacts on various areas of the economy, the State and social and political life.

INTERNATIONAL DIPLOMA IN PERSONAL DATA PROTECTION (PDP)

The [International Diploma in Personal Data Protection](#) is a program aimed at professionals from the fields of law, communication, computer science, sociology and political science, among other disciplines, with the objective of providing advanced knowledge in legal and public policy aspects related to the processing of personal data and the different privacy laws enacted at regional and international level. It has two training stages: the first is introductory and then a more intensive training aimed at enabling future graduates to work as data protection officers.





DIPLOMA IN INTERNET GOVERNANCE (DIGI)

Students, professors and experts from 8 countries in Latin America and the world participated in a new edition of DiGI, [Diploma in Internet Governance](#), at the Graduate School of the Catholic University of Uruguay with the institutional support of CETyS. In this edition of the program, we used both theoretical and practical approaches to address governance, regulation, and national, regional, and international public policies applied to the internet, Artificial Intelligence, digital platforms, childhood and adolescence, inclusion, and participation—bringing Latin American and Caribbean perspectives into dialogue with international processes.

COURSES AND WORKSHOPS

OUR PARTNERSHIP WITH WIKIMEDIA CONTINUES



As part of our commitment to promoting free access to knowledge and developing digital skills for active citizenship in this technological era, we developed the free virtual course “The Impact of Artificial Intelligence on the Exercise of Fundamental Rights in the Digital Environment”, in collaboration with Wikimedia Argentina.

During this eight-week training, which brought together over 130 participants from across the region, we explored data governance, platform regulation, intellectual property, and freedom of expression in the AI era. Additionally, we delved into the use of generative AI for writing and editing.

We continue to promote free access to knowledge and the development of digital skills for active citizenship in this technological age.

FORGING AN AGENDA AND COMMUNITIES OF PRACTICE FOR THE RESPONSIBLE ADOPTION OF GENERATIVE AI IN LATIN AMERICA



REGIONAL WORKSHOP TOUR ON GENERATIVE AI IN THE JUDICIARY

Throughout 2025, CETyS consolidated its leadership at the intersection of artificial intelligence and the judicial sphere, successfully concluding the workshop phase “Generative AI and the judiciary: building an agenda for responsible adoption”, the final stage of the regional project “Latin America at the crossroads of generative AI and its responsible adoption in the judicial sphere”, which began in 2024. The main objectives of this strategic initiative were:

i.) To reflect on the findings of the preliminary national reports prepared in the previous phase.

ii.) To encourage the creation of national agendas and communities of practice to promote the responsible adoption of generative AI in the judiciary.

SCOPE AND METHODOLOGY

The project was rolled out through a series of multisectoral workshops held in four relevant countries in the region, bringing together key actors from the ecosystem: local judiciary staff, academics, civil society, the private sector, and technical experts.



1. ARGENTINA (MAY):

The meeting focused on building a national agenda, continuing the line of work that CETyS has been carrying out since 2020.

Local challenges, opportunities, and advantages were identified in relation to innovation and regulation of generative AI.

2. Regulatory and ethical challenges.
3. Need for training and education in the judicial ecosystem.

CLOSING OF THIS PHASE OF TRAVELING MEETINGS



In November, we invited participants to the “Dialogue: AI & the Judiciary”, an open virtual meeting where more than 60 people gathered to reflect on the present and digital future of justice in our region.

It was an excellent opportunity to analyze the conclusions and impact of the project and exchange ideas with the researchers, collaborators, and institutions that participated in this process. 3 Strategic Meetings in Germany:

HEMISPHERES Project Forum

(July, Burghausen):

Our representatives, Carolina Aguerre, Fernanda Martínez, and María Pilar Llorens, participated in the first in-person meeting. The debate was structured around six crucial areas: artificial intelligence, new technologies and metaverses, the Internet, platforms, equity and security, privacy and security, and youth and media.



HEMISPHERES Workshop & Consortium Exchange

(November, Munich):

This strategic meeting, organized in collaboration with the European Education and Culture Executive Agency (EACEA), sought to establish a shared vision, review achievements, and chart a roadmap for increasing impact on public policy and long-term growth. Carolina Aguerre presented the progress made by the Internet working group, while María Pilar Llorens shared the results of Privacy and Security, reaffirming the integration of the Latin American perspective.

4 Participation in the AoIR 2025 Conference:

Carolina Aguerre participated in the 2025 Association of Internet Researchers Conference (AoIR 2025 Ruptures) in Niterói, Brazil. Her work, "Synthetic data and global finance. Narratives, (dis)continuities, and ruptures", was part of a meeting that sought to challenge the dominance of Western discourses and highlight Latin America's pioneering role in the development of theoretical frameworks and strategies of active resistance to data colonialism.



This set of activities underlines CETyS' commitment to transnational research, knowledge creation from the Global South, and direct influence on digital cooperation agendas between the European Union and Latin America.



AI GOVERNANCE IN LATIN AMERICA

We share the article “Regional cooperation crucial for AI safety and governance in Latin America” by Maia Levy Daniel, associate researcher with CETyS. Maia explores the current landscape of AI governance in Latin America and shares a series of recommendations for the region to shape AI safety and governance from a human rights perspective.

DATA PROTECTION LAW

“THE METAVERSE IN LATIN AMERICA”



As part of the Metaverse edition of our GuIA project—an initiative to research, discuss, and reflect on the ethics, principles, standards, and policies of Artificial Intelligence—on Tuesday, March 25, we released the document “The Metaverse in Latin America: a first approach to the potential impact on privacy and personal data protection”, a report by Matías Jackson Berton and Maia Levy Daniel.

The document describes the Latin American regulatory landscape with regard to privacy and personal data protection, presents the exchanges and lessons learned from the discussion workshop between specialists from civil society, academia, and the private sector in the region that we organized in 2022, and outlines a first approach to the impact of the metaverse in Latin America and preliminary recommendations for the development of metaverse governance.

Our co-director, Pablo Palazzi, along with a prominent group of colleagues, published the book “International transfer of personal data in Latin America: Towards harmonization of standards”.

This work, co-authored with Nelson Remolina Angarita, Ana Brian Nougères, Luca Belli, and Jonathan Mendoza Iserte, is the result of a long and productive process. It all began with a paper presented at the 2023 CPDP LatAm, which was later enriched with valuable community feedback and published in the work “Personal Data Protection: Doctrine and Case Law”.

In 2024, the project was recognized with the prestigious Policymakers Award from the Future of Privacy Forum, which drove its evolution into this comprehensive book.

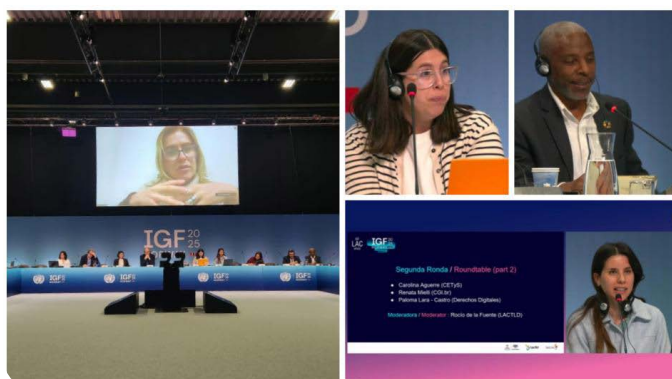

At the IGF 2025 LAC Space (Internet Governance Forum) in Norway, which we co-organized with LACNIC and LACTLD, organizations, key stakeholders, and researchers from the region gathered to reflect on the evolution of Internet governance in Latin America and the Caribbean, discussing how their latest projects have contributed to economic and social inclusion, the advancement of human rights, and the guarantee of universal access.

During her speech, Carolina Aguerre urged the strengthening and continuity of the IGF's multistakeholder model in the Latin American and Caribbean region in order to ensure and strengthen the region's representation and influence in international forums and other instances.

HIGHLIGHT -

HOSTS OF THE 17th CPR LATAM 2025

This year, we hosted the 17th Communication Policy Research (CPR) LATAM Conference 2025 at Universidad de San Andrés.



The event brought together key leaders—academics, industry, government, and civil society—to discuss digital transformation in the region. Crucial topics such as artificial intelligence, the environmental impact of technology, and the digital divides affecting Latin America were addressed.

The conference reaffirmed the need to approach digital transformation from a regional perspective, prioritizing equity, sustainability, and sovereignty. CPR LATAM 2025 provided valuable insights, and CETyS remains committed to facilitating these meetings to generate better policies in digital technologies.

COMPETITION FORUM

Our affiliated researcher, Fernanda Vicens, participated in the OECD's Latin American and Caribbean Competition Forum 2025 in Paraguay.



Fernanda presented regional cases in the session on “Remedies in digital markets”, applying a competition analysis topology, which enriched the debate.

The discussion was very valuable, confirming that the region is beginning to see concrete results in digital regulation (including proposals from Brazil and Chile). It also highlights the importance of research into competition policies adapted to Latin America.

EUROPEAN CONVENTION ON HUMAN RIGHTS

Pilar Llorens, associate researcher, participated in a panel discussion on the implications of artificial intelligence for human rights, particularly in the work of human rights courts, during the symposium “The European Convention on Human Rights at 75: Transnational Perspectives and Global Interaction” in Berlin.



Dr. Llorens' presentation, based on the findings of CETyS's research project “[Latin America at the crossroads of generative AI and its responsible adoption in the judicial sphere](#)” at the domestic level, focused on two aspects: i) the consequences of deploying and using AI (especially generative AI) in the daily work of courts, highlighting the need to ask why these tools are needed; and ii) the impact that the jurisprudence of human rights courts can have on AI governance, especially considering that most existing regulatory frameworks contain references to human rights.

GLOBAL DIGITAL RIGHTS

Global Digital Rights Carolina Aguerre participated in the Global Network Initiative (GNI) 2025 Annual Learning Forum, held alongside CELE's “Towards a Free Internet” workshop, and the workshop “Shaping Global AI Governance Through Multistakeholder Dialogue”, which served as an official pre-event for the 2026 AI Impact Summit.

During these sessions, international and regional experts debated how geopolitical and technological transformations are redefining the online human rights environment, with a special emphasis on Latin American perspectives.

Our congratulations to CELE and GNI for joining forces toward strengthening freedom of expression and fundamental rights in the digital environment.



10th ANNUAL FINTECH LAW ARGENTINA 2025 CONFERENCE



On November 3, we successfully held the 10th edition of the Annual Fintech Law Argentina 2025 Conference, co-organized with the Master's Degree in Business Law (MDN) at UdeSA.

Industry leaders discussed Fintech regulation, analyzing the industry's 10-year history, advances in Open Banking, and challenges in Virtual Assets and Tokenization. The meeting also addressed the tax challenges facing the ecosystem.

After these first 10 years, the annual Fintech Law Argentina conference continues to establish itself

as a key space for promoting reflection and debate on financial technological innovation and its legal framework in Argentina and the region.

AT LACIGF 2025

In November, the Latin American and Caribbean Internet Governance Forum (LACIGF) took place in the city of Córdoba.

We had the pleasure of participating in the panel “Geopolitics of digital infrastructure: can Latin America build sovereignty in the era of AI?”, alongside experts in digital geopolitics and data governance. We debated how the Global North’s technological race impacts Latin America, aiming to highlight infrastructure as the core of digital power and explore courses of action for the region. We also participated in the session “Internet resource governance in Latin America and the Caribbean: Multisectoral approach, regulation, and fragmentation”, in which we explored the governance of Internet resources in the region, analyzing common principles, different institutional arrangements, and the challenges that currently condition established governance and management processes, with the objective of identifying solutions based on the multistakeholder model.



These have been intense and productive days of dialogue and learning. Beyond the concrete progress achieved, the path traveled confirms that regional challenges persist. To ensure the robustness of the Internet in Latin America, we must promote and support the creation of public policies that synthesize the participation of multiple sectors with a non-negotiable foundation of technical knowledge and evidence.

STRATEGIC DIALOGUE: AI AND DIGITAL INNOVATION WITH UK EXPERTS

On November 25, in co-organization with Civic Compass, we hosted an enriching in-person dialogue between British and Argentine specialists and academics centered on AI and Digital Innovation.

The meeting revolved around a key question: How can bilateral collaboration between

experts help design AI policies that promote both competitiveness and inclusion? The session was a vital space for exchange that underlines the importance of international cooperation in addressing the challenges of technological governance.

We were honored to have the distinguished participation of Harry Farmer (Ada Lovelace Institute) and Matilda Titeca (UK Department for Science, Innovation & Technology), two international leaders in AI ethics, governance, and public policy. Their presentations offered a crucial global perspective on how to balance technological advancement with values of equity. The dialogue allowed for a deeper exploration of how technical evidence and the exchange of experiences are fundamental to developing a regulatory framework that maximizes the benefits of AI for all of society.

IGF ARGENTINA 2025

In December, the Argentina Internet Governance Forum (IGF) 2025 was held. Fernanda Martínez moderated the session on Artificial Intelligence and Public Policy, featuring the participation of Martín Gendler (CONICET), Valentín Betroni (Science Policy Research Unit), Julia Kampel (Young AI Leaders: Buenos Aires Hub), and Marina Bericua (Microsoft).

We recognize Internet Governance Forums as indispensable platforms for a comprehensive discussion of digital issues, ensuring the presence of all necessary voices (government, academia, private sector, technical community, and civil society). At CETyS, we actively support and promote these spaces in the region. Our goal is to foster an informed and representative dialogue that lays the groundwork for the collective construction of an Internet that remains always open, stable, and secure.



AI AND PRIVACY



The International Diploma in Personal Data Protection (PDP) celebrated its 3rd Annual Personal Data Protection Conference. Held at the Riobamba Auditorium in Buenos Aires, with a live online broadcast, the event established itself as a key space for regional debate.

This year, the discussion focused on the complex and urgent intersection between Personal Data Protection and Artificial Intelligence in Latin America. The conference featured prominent multisectoral participation from both national and international levels. Through presentations and panel

discussions, attendees explored the ethical, legal, and regulatory challenges that AI poses to privacy regimes. This dialogue highlights CETyS's commitment to disseminating sound technical information and promoting a robust data protection framework adapted to emerging technologies.

LAUNCH OF ANCI IN CHILE

In January, Marcela Pallero, DTD professor, participated in the first episode of the 2025 podcast of Chile's National Cybersecurity Agency (ANCI), alongside the agency's director, Daniel Álvarez, answering key questions from the public and private sectors and inquiries about the implementation of its Cybersecurity Law, as well as discussing the main challenges in the region.

DEBATE ON THE TRANSFORMATION OF COPYRIGHT MANAGEMENT

As part of the legislative reforms on copyright in Argentina, a meeting was held entitled "Transforming copyright management: competition and transparency as key pillars".

The event, co-organized with ICC Argentina and the Argentine Chamber of Commerce and Services, brought together experts from the sector to discuss the challenges and opportunities posed by the opening of the market, previously monopolized by Collective Management Organizations (CMOs).

Silvana Rivero, Fernanda Viegens, and Sebastián Cabello revisited the discussions raised in their paper "Collective management of copyright in Latin America: challenges and opportunities arising from advances in the digital economy" ([document in Spanish](#)), focusing on the structural challenges of the collective copyright management system in Argentina and the urgent need to reform it.

Among the key points addressed, they emphasized the need to foster a competitive environment following the elimination of legal monopolies, noting that CMOs have a special responsibility under competition law and must avoid exclusionary conduct that limits both individual management and the emergence of new service providers. Transparency in their actions is key to preventing abuses of dominant position and ensuring a fairer and more efficient system in today's digital ecosystem.

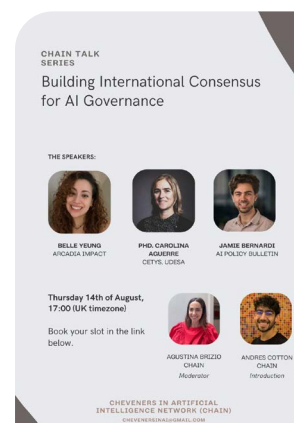

AN INTERNATIONAL CONSENSUS FOR AI GOVERNANCE

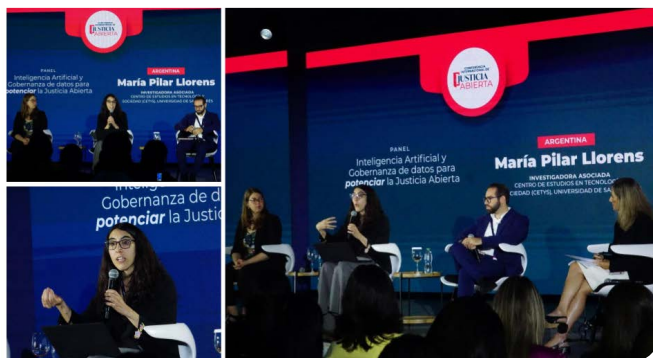


Within the framework of the CHAIN Talk initiative, Chevening scholars from Argentina organized an open dialogue on the creation of an international consensus for AI governance.

Moderated by Agustina Brizio, with opening remarks by Andrés Cotton, the meeting centered on AI governance, exploring perspectives and challenges to achieving an international agreement in this field. The panel presented various stances and strategies necessary to establish regulatory frameworks that enable the responsible development and use of AI on a global scale.

AI AND DATA GOVERNANCE TO ENHANCE OPEN JUSTICE



We participated in the First International Conference on Open Justice, held in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, organized by RIJA and the OGP, in pursuit of a justice system that is more accessible, transparent, and people-centered.

María Pilar Llorens presented on the panel regarding the challenges of AI in justice. In her presentation, she addressed the ethical, legal, and structural complexities involved in using AI within the judicial system, highlighting the need for proper regulation and training.



AI SAFETY IN LATAM

Carolina Aguerre participated in the high-level event “Advancing AI Safety in Latin America: Learning from Local Experiences”, held at the British Embassy in Mexico City.

Organized by the Secretariat for the International AI Safety Report of the UK’s AI Security Institute (AISi) and Eon Institute, this meeting gathered leaders, experts, and key stakeholders from the AI ecosystem in LATAM.

Based on the findings and recommendations of the International AI Safety Report 2025, high-level leaders from eight countries explored its particular relevance for the region, reflected on global AI risks, and analyzed specific challenges and opportunities for Latin America to move toward a safer, more responsible, and inclusive future in the development and adoption of this technology.



AI AND FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS

We participated in the conference “The Crossroads of the 21st Century: Artificial Intelligence and Fundamental Rights”, organized by the CPACF (Public Bar Association of the City of Buenos Aires) alongside Editorial Jusbares and Fundación MEDIFÉ.

Among the experts who discussed Latin American and European perspectives and approaches toward the global challenges of AI, Carolina Aguerre shared her reflections on regional AI governance.

AI AND JUSTICE IN BRAZIL

Fernanda Martínez participated in the international seminar "Artificial Intelligence and the Justice System in Latin America", held in São Paulo on October 9 and 10, 2025.

The meeting, organized by the Public Defense Office of São Paulo and the EFF, brought together specialists to reflect on the challenges and potential of AI within the justice system. Throughout the sessions, crucial topics such as access to justice, due process, regulatory frameworks, and transparency were debated. CETyS's presence in this international forum highlights our commitment to the responsible adoption of these technologies within the region's judicial sphere.

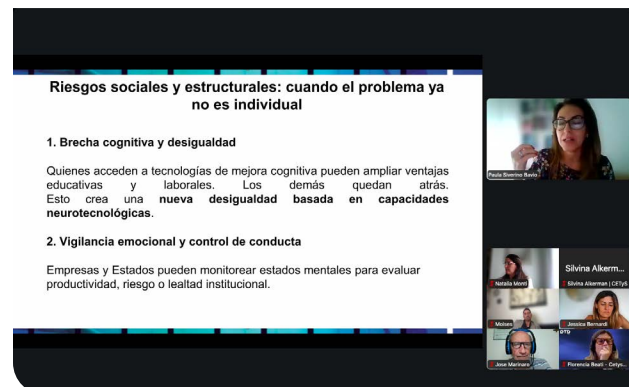
